



**View 01 The edge of the settlement on PRow Barr 7/2 looking south east**

Long distance views are available from the southern edge of the settlement due to open nature of the landscape and its location on a localised ridge. The view connects Barrowby to the surrounding countryside which is typical of the described character: featuring an undulating agricultural landscape, visually linked to the higher ground to the south which includes assets such as Harlaxton Manor. These views contribute to the setting of the settlement in its local context.

These views are experienced by residents, users of the recreational facilities and the users of the local PRow.



**View 02 - Casthorpe Road approaching the settlement from the west**

Casthorpe Road is the gateway to the settlement, approaching from the west and the Casthorpe Hills towards the Conservation Area. Although more modern development has been constructed along the road, views southeast connect the settlement to its landscape setting, the mature protected trees adding time depth and a distinct character to this aspect of the village.

These views are experienced by users of the local road network including walkers, cyclist, pedestrians and horse riders.



**View 03 - Approaching the settlement on PRoW Barr/8/1 from the west**

These views capture the village on the higher ground in its wider landscape setting, as with VP01, the open nature of the landscape is apparent along with its distinct rural qualities and the relationship of the settlement to its setting. The church is visible between the mature trees on Casthorpe Road and the PRoW provides a historic link across the countryside, from Woolsthorpe to Barrowby, crossing the canal, and ultimately via Low Road to Grantham.

These views are experienced by users of the PRoW network to the west.



**View 04 - Views from the south east on PRow Barr/9/2**

Views from the historic byway, connecting Harlaxton Lower Lodge and the towpath along the Grantham Canal to the south of the settlement. The approach across the low lying landscape with the spire visible above the settlement buildings is a key feature of the view.



**View 05 - Views from the Drift looking along PRow Barr/9/2**

This view, along with VP04, represents the important connection between Barrowby and the landscape to the south, looking towards the ridgeline including Harlaxton Manor. The view is open across the lower lying landscape towards the vegetated slopes associated with the Manor. These views contribute to the time depth value of the landscape views are experienced by users of the local PRow network. `



**View 06 - From the Drift to the south of the settlement**

The Drift – a name for the practice of ‘drifting’ livestock along a road, connects the settlements of Barrowby to Harlaxton via the canal, where the Harlaxton Wharf was located and the Harlaxton Bridge crosses the canal. The Drift travels north south, dropping down from Harlaxton to the canal before rising up to what was Harlaxton Lodge and is now North Lodge, south of the settlement. Views are glimpsed along the road, through mature roadside, avenue style tree planting in hedgerows, before opening up to reveal Barrowby on the higher ground. These views capture the time depth and history of the settlement and its surroundings.

The view is experienced by users of the local road network, including cyclists, users of connecting PRowWs and horse riders.



### **View 07 - Views from Harlaxton**

Harlaxton is located directly south of Barrowby on the opposite ridgeline, the Manor being an important visual link with the settlement. Harlaxton Park, a Registered Park and Garden is located north of Harlaxton Road and The Drift to the north east.

Views open out to the north along Harlaxton Road revealing the shape, nature, scale and composition of Barrowby in its landscape setting. New development is apparent on the eastern side in comparison to the western edge. The mature trees on Casthorpe Road are a prominent feature.

The view is experienced by users of Harlaxton Road which includes pedestrian and vehicle users.



**View 08 - View from the northern settlement edge**

From the northern edge very long ranging, open, panoramic views across the landscape are captured. The mature trees which form the edge of the rising ground to the north are prominent as the remaining wider landscape is generally sparse with the exception of the settlements which are well vegetated. The A1 is visible but not dominant and in the longer distance commercial development is just visible. It is an interesting and active view, contrary to views to and from the south which are more settled and quieter. These views are experienced by users of the local PRow, the visitors to the cemetery and residents.



**View 09 - View from the north towards Barrowby**

These views represent the gateway to Barrowby from the north. They are located on the edge of the A52 where Barr/1/2 joins it and, on the Byway, running north south (Barr/2/1).

Although this is a busy landscape, the view is relatively quiet and settlement and captures the church on its hilltop setting, surrounded by mature vegetation with very little other built development visible. The fields on the slopes below the church remain largely intact and allude to the smaller scale farming activities of the past, close to the settlement edge.

These views are experienced by road users and users of the local PRow.



**View 10 - View from the north towards Barrowby**

These views represent the gateway to Barrowby from the north. They are located on the edge of the A52 where Barr/1/2 joins it and, on the Byway, running north south (Barr/2/1). Although this is a busy landscape, the view is relatively quiet and settlement and captures the church on its hilltop setting, surrounded by mature vegetation with very little other built development visible.
